GENERAL SUBJECT: THE CRUCIAL POINTS OF THE TRUTH IN PAUL'S EPISTLES— EPHESIANS

Message Five

The Universal Building and the Local Building

Scripture Reading: Eph. 2:20-22

Eph. 2:20-22—Being built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Christ Jesus Himself being the cornerstone; ²¹In whom all the building, being fitted together, is growing into a holy temple in the Lord; ²²In whom you also are being built together into a dwelling place of God in spirit.

I. In Ephesians 2:20-22 is the revelation of the building in two aspects—the universal aspect and the local aspect:

Eph. 2:20-22—Being built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Christ Jesus Himself being the cornerstone; ²¹In whom all the building, being fitted together, is growing into a holy temple in the Lord; ²²In whom you also are being built together into a dwelling place of God in spirit.

- A. Universally, the church is uniquely one, and the church in a particular locality is locally one.
- B. In verse 21 we see the universal aspect of the church: "All the building, being fitted together, is growing into a holy temple in the Lord."
- C. In verse 22 we have the local aspect: "You also are being built together into a dwelling place of God in spirit."
- D. The holy temple refers to the universal aspect, and the dwelling place of God, to the local aspect:
 - All the local churches added together equal the universal church—Acts 16:5.
 Acts 16:5—And so the churches were strengthened in the faith and increased in number daily.
 - 2. Apart from the local churches there is no universal church.
 - 3. The building of the local churches is the building of the universal church.

II. Ephesians 2:20 says, "Being built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Christ Jesus Himself being the cornerstone":

- A. As the Body of Christ, the church is God's building; we need to pay attention to the foundation—1 Cor. 3:10-11.
 - **1 Cor. 3:10-11**—According to the grace of God given to me, as a wise master builder I have laid a foundation, and another builds upon *it*. But let each man take heed how he builds upon *it*. ¹¹For another foundation no one is able to lay besides that which is laid, which is Jesus Christ.

- B. The foundation of the apostles and prophets is the revelation they received regarding Christ and the church for the building up of the church—Eph. 2:20: **Eph. 2:20**—Being built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Christ Jesus Himself being the cornerstone;
 - 1. The church is built upon this revelation.
 - This is the meaning of the foundation in Ephesians 2:20.
 Eph. 2:20—Being built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Christ Jesus Himself being the cornerstone;
- C. Verse 20 reveals that in God's building Christ is the cornerstone: Eph. 2:20—Being built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Christ Jesus Himself being the cornerstone;
 - 1. Christ was raised from the dead by God, becoming the cornerstone of God's building with God's salvation being uniquely in Him—Acts 4:10-12.
 Acts 4:10-12—Let it be known to you all and to all the people of Israel that in the name of Jesus Christ the Nazarene, whom you crucified and whom God has raised from the dead, in this name this man stands before you in good health. ¹¹This is the stone which was considered as nothing by you, the builders, which has become the head of the corner. ¹²And there is salvation in no other, for neither is there another name under heaven given among men in which we must be saved.
 - Psalm 118:22 speaks of Christ as the cornerstone for God's building, and Ephesians 2:20 speaks of "Christ Jesus Himself being the cornerstone."
 Psa. 118:22—The stone which the builders rejected Has become the head of the corner.

Eph. 2:20—Being built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Christ Jesus Himself being the cornerstone;

III. In Christ Jesus "all the building, being fitted together, is growing into a holy temple in the Lord"—v. 21:

- A. Here we see that in Christ, who is the cornerstone, all the building, including both the Jewish and the Gentile believers, is fitted together and is growing into a holy temple in the Lord.
- B. Since the building is a living one (1 Pet. 2:5), it is growing into a holy temple:

 1 Pet. 2:5—You yourselves also, as living stones, are being built up as a spiritual house into a holy priesthood to offer up spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ.
 - 1. The actual building of the church as the house of God is by the believers' growth in life.
 - 2. Today the church is growing; however, it is not growing in our natural life but in the divine life, the spiritual life—Col. 1:6, 10.

 Col. 1:6—Which has come to you, even as it is also in all the world, bearing fruit and growing, as also in you, since the day you heard and knew the grace of God in truth;
 - **Col. 1:10**—To walk worthily of the Lord to please *Him* in all things, bearing fruit in every good work and growing by the full knowledge of God,

- C. Ephesians 2:21 also says that all the building is fitted together; the word *fitted* means "being made suitable for the condition and situation of the building." Eph. 2:21—In whom all the building, being fitted together, is growing into a holy temple in the Lord;
- D. As verse 21 points out, all the building is growing into a holy temple:
 Eph. 2:21—In whom all the building, being fitted together, is growing into a holy temple in the Lord;
 - 1. The Greek word rendered "temple" means "the sanctuary, the inner part of the holy temple."
 - 2. This means that the entire building of God's house as His sanctuary is in Christ the Lord.
- E. The phrase *all the building* refers to the universal church:
 - In Matthew 16:18 the Lord Jesus said that He would build the church: "I will build My church, and the gates of Hades shall not prevail against it."
 Matt. 16:18—And I also say to you that you are Peter, and upon this rock I will build My church, and the gates of Hades shall not prevail against it.
 - 2. The building in Matthew 16:18 is the building in Ephesians 2:21.

 Matt. 16:18—And I also say to you that you are Peter, and upon this rock I will build My church, and the gates of Hades shall not prevail against it.

Eph. 2:21—In whom all the building, being fitted together, is growing into a holy temple in the Lord;

IV. In Christ Jesus "you also are being built together into a dwelling place of God in spirit"—v. 22:

A. The word *you* in verse 22, which refers to the local saints, indicates that the building in verse 21 is universal and that the building in verse 22 is local. **Eph. 2:22**—In whom you also are being built together into a dwelling place of God in spirit.

Eph. 2:21—In whom all the building, being fitted together, is growing into a holy temple in the Lord;

- B. In this verse Paul was saying that the local saints were being built together in Christ into a dwelling place of God.
- C. In these verses Paul covered both the universal aspect and the local aspect—vv. 21-22:

Eph. 2:21-22—In whom all the building, being fitted together, is growing into a holy temple in the Lord; ²²In whom you also are being built together into a dwelling place of God in spirit.

- 1. All the building is growing—this refers to the universal aspect.
- 2. The believers in a particular locality are being built together—this is the local aspect.
- D. The temple and the dwelling place refer to two aspects of the same thing:
 - 1. The temple is the place in which God's people contact God, worship Him, and hear His oracle.

- 2. The dwelling place is a place of rest; God rests in His dwelling place.
- 3. No matter how many churches there may be on earth, there is still just one building with these two aspects.
- E. Verse 22 says that we are being built together into a dwelling place of God in spirit:

Eph. 2:22—In whom you also are being built together into a dwelling place of God in spirit.

- 1. *Spirit* here refers to the believers' human spirit, which is indwelt by God's Holy Spirit.
- 2. God's Spirit is the Dweller, not the dwelling place.
- 3. The dwelling place is in the believers' spirit.
- 4. God's Spirit dwells in our spirit; therefore, the dwelling place of God is in our spirit.
- F. Verse 21 says that the holy temple is in the Lord, and verse 22, that the dwelling place of God is in spirit:

Eph. 2:21—In whom all the building, being fitted together, is growing into a holy temple in the Lord;

Eph. 2:22—In whom you also are being built together into a dwelling place of God in spirit.

- 1. This indicates that the Lord is one with our spirit, and our spirit is one with the Lord.
- 2. To be in our spirit is actually to be in the Lord; also, to be in the Lord is to be in the spirit.
- 3. He who is joined to the Lord is one spirit—1 Cor. 6:17. **1 Cor. 6:17**—But he who is joined to the Lord is one spirit.
- 4. We cannot separate our spirit from the Lord; thus, our spirit is the place where the building of the church is.
- 5. The building is not in our mind, emotion, soul, or heart; it is absolutely a matter in our spirit.
